

COMMITTEE MARKUP ACTION SUMMARY REPORT

The Committee on Natural Resources met in open session on February 27, 2014, to consider the following bills:

H.R. 1103 (Young of Alaska), To amend the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act to provide that Alexander Creek, Alaska, is and shall be recognized as an eligible Native village under that Act, and for other purposes.

The Subcommittee on Indian and Alaska Native Affairs was discharged from further consideration of H.R. 1103 by unanimous consent.

Adopted and favorably reported to the House of Representatives by voice vote.

H.R. 1259 (Larson), To establish Coltsville National Historical Park in the State of Connecticut, and for other purposes. (*Coltsville National Historical Park Act*)

The Subcommittee on Public Lands and Environmental Regulation was discharged from further consideration of H.R. 1259 by unanimous consent.

- An amendment offered by Mr. Bishop of Utah Amendment #1, was AGREED TO by unanimous consent.

Adopted and favorably reported to the House of Representatives, as amended, by unanimous consent.

H.R. 3110 (Young of Alaska), To allow for the harvest of gull eggs by the Huna Tlingit people within Glacier Bay National Park in the State of Alaska. (*Huna Tlingit Traditional Gull Egg Use Act*)

The Subcommittees on Indian and Alaska Native Affairs, and Public Lands and Environmental Regulation were discharged from further consideration of H.R. 3110 by unanimous consent.

- An amendment offered by Mr. Young of Alaska Amendment #1, was AGREED TO by unanimous consent.

Adopted and favorably reported to the House of Representatives, as amended, by unanimous consent.

H.R. 3605 (Lujan Grisham), To make a technical amendment to the T'uf Shur Bien Preservation Trust Area Act, and for other purposes. (*Sandia Pueblo Settlement Technical Amendment Act*)

The Subcommittees on Indian and Alaska Native Affairs, and Public Lands and Environmental Regulation were discharged from further consideration of H.R. 3605 by unanimous consent.

Adopted and favorably reported to the House of Representatives by unanimous consent.
