Amendment in the Nature of a Substitute to H.R. 6994

OFFERED BY MR. WESTERMAN OF ARKANSAS

Strike all after the enacting clause and insert the following:

1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

2 This Act may be cited as the "Restoring Our Un3 opened Trails for Enjoyment and Safety Act" or the
4 "ROUTES Act".

5 SEC. 2. REOPENING OF COVERED RECREATION SITES6CLOSED DUE TO NATURAL DISASTERS.

7 (a) REOPENING REQUIRED.—In the case of a covered
8 recreation site that is fully or partially closed due to per9 sonal injury or damage caused by a natural disaster, the
10 Secretary concerned shall—

(1) reopen such covered recreation site not later
than 3 years after the date on which such natural
disaster ends, as determined by the Secretary concerned; and

(2) if the covered recreation site is not reopened
on or before the date described in paragraph (1), not
later than 30 days after such date and every 90 days
thereafter during which such site remains closed,

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submit to Congress a report identifying the barriers
 to reopening such site.

3 (b) CATEGORICAL EXCLUSION FOR COVERED RECRE-4 ATION SITE RESTORATION.—

5 (1) CATEGORICAL EXCLUSION ESTABLISHED.— 6 Activities described in paragraph (2) are a category 7 of actions hereby designated as being categorically 8 excluded from the preparation of an environmental 9 assessment or an environmental impact statement 10 under section 102 of the National Environmental 11 Policy Act of 1969 (42 U.S.C. 4332).

12 (2) ACTIVITIES DESIGNATED FOR CATEGORICAL EXCLUSION.—The activities designated under this 13 14 section for a categorical exclusion are activities car-15 ried out by the Secretary concerned on Interior rec-16 reational lands or National Forest System lands 17 where the primary purpose of such activity is, con-18 sistent with the land use plan applicable to such 19 lands, to—

20 (A) repair and restore covered recreation
21 sites damaged by a natural disaster;

(B) remove or mitigate hazard trees for
the purpose of public safety, protection of property, or improving access to a covered recreation site;

1	(C) mitigate and reduce soil erosion im-
2	pacting a covered recreation site;
3	(D) restore drainage patterns to support a
4	covered recreation site; or
5	(E) any combination of the purposes speci-
6	fied in subparagraphs (A) through (D).
7	(3) AVAILABILITY OF CATEGORICAL EXCLU-
8	SION.—On and after the date of the enactment of
9	this Act, the Secretary concerned may use the cat-
10	egorical exclusion established under paragraph (1) in
11	accordance with this subsection.
12	(4) EXTRAORDINARY CIRCUMSTANCES.—The
13	activities categorically excluded under paragraph (1)
14	shall be subject to the extraordinary circumstances
15	procedures established pursuant to section 1501.4 of
16	title 40, Code of Federal Regulations (or any suc-
17	cessor regulation).
18	(c) Emergency Hazard Tree Removal.—
19	(1) NATIONAL FOREST SYSTEM LANDS.—With
20	respect to the removal or mitigation of hazard trees
21	located on a parcel of National Forest System land,
22	during the 3-year period after a natural disaster on
23	such parcel ends, as determined by the Secretary of
24	Agriculture, section 220.4(b) of title 36, Code of
25	Federal Regulations (as in effect on the date of the

enactment of this Act) shall have the force and ef fect of law with respect to such parcel.

3 (2) INTERIOR RECREATIONAL LANDS.—With re-4 spect to the removal and mitigation of hazard trees 5 located on Interior recreational lands, during the 3-6 year period after a natural disaster on such parcel 7 ends, as determined by the Secretary of the Interior, 8 section 46.150 of title 43, Code of Federal Regula-9 tions (as in effect on the date of the enactment of 10 this Act) shall have the force and effect of law with 11 respect to such parcel.

12 (d) REPORT.—Not later than 2 years after the date 13 of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary concerned shall 14 submit to Congress, and make publicly available on the 15 website of the Department of the Interior and the Depart-16 ment of Agriculture, a report that includes the number 17 of covered recreation sites—

18 (1) that have been reopened pursuant to sub-19 section (a)(1); and

20 (2) that, as of the date of such report, are
21 closed due to damage caused by a natural disaster
22 and the date such natural disaster ended, as deter23 mined by the Secretary concerned.

24 (e) DEFINITIONS.—In this section:

1	(1) COVERED RECREATION SITE.—The term
2	"covered recreation site" means—
3	(A) a campground or developed day-use
4	recreation site that—
5	(i) is operated by the Secretary con-
6	cerned; and
7	(ii) is located on Interior recreational
8	lands or National Forest System lands; or
9	(B) a road or trail that—
10	(i) is under the jurisdiction of the
11	Secretary concerned;
12	(ii) used to access or serve a camp-
13	ground or developed day-use recreation site
14	described in subparagraph (A); and
15	(iii) is located on Interior recreational
16	lands or National Forest System lands.
17	(2) HAZARD TREE.—The term "hazard tree"
18	means a standing tree that presents a visible hazard
19	to people or property due to conditions such as the
20	deterioration of, or damage to—
21	(A) the root system, trunk, stem, or limbs
22	of the tree; or
23	(B) the direction or lean of the tree.
24	(3) INTERIOR RECREATIONAL LANDS.—The
25	term "Interior recreational lands" means lands man-

1	aged by the National Park Service, the United
2	States Fish and Wildlife Service, the Bureau of
3	Land Management, or the Bureau of Reclamation.
4	(4) NATIONAL FOREST SYSTEM.—The term
5	"National Forest System" has the meaning given
6	that term in section 11(a) of the Forest and Range-
7	land Renewable Resources Planning Act of 1974 (16
8	U.S.C. 1609(a)).
9	(5) NATURAL DISASTER.—The term "natural
10	disaster" includes a wildfire, flood, hurricane, wind-
11	storm, erosion, and tornado.
12	(6) Secretary concerned.—The term "Sec-
13	retary concerned" means—
14	(A) the Secretary of the Interior, with re-
15	spect to Interior recreational lands; or
16	(B) the Secretary of Agriculture, with re-
17	spect to National Forest System lands.

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
