Dear Secretary Haaland and Director Stone-Manning:

The House Committee on Natural Resources (Committee) continues to seek information related to the cancellation of two decades-old mineral leases in the Superior National Forest (Twin Metals leases) and the withdrawal of 225,504 acres of mineral-rich land in the same area from mineral exploration and development (Superior Withdrawal). The Committee sent the U.S. Department of the Interior (DOI) and the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) three previous letters—on November 20, 2023,¹ January 8, 2024,² and August 27, 2024³—to which we received either an inadequate response or no response at all.

The production the Committee previously received was largely unresponsive. For example, the Committee received no explanation of how cancelling the Twin Metals leases or withdrawing hundreds of thousands of acres of mineral-rich lands from exploration and development supports reducing our nation's dependence on minerals sourced from foreign adversaries. Moreover, the Committee received duplicate documents, blank pages, and unidentified calendar invitations. Worse yet, the Committee received no evidence that either the DOI or BLM considered the economic or practical impact on businesses in Northern Minnesota before choosing to obstruct mineral production there.

The Committee is reiterating our requests for documents and information from January 20, 2021, to the present below. In response to the requests for which responsive documents were

previously received, we expect to receive a certification by October 22, 2024, that no responsive documents are outstanding or are otherwise being withheld from the Committee. In response to requests for which the Committee has yet to receive responsive documents, we expect to receive a complete production, in electronic format, by October 22, 2024.

The Committee requires certification of completion for the following three requests:

1. All documents and communications regarding any nonprofits, nongovernmental agencies, and any individuals affiliated with any nonprofits or nongovernmental agencies DOI and BLM consulted with regarding Twin Metals, the Superior Withdrawal, and/or the Boundary Waters watershed. For any entities or individuals listed, please describe the nature of the coordination and provide any communications and/or documents related to the coordination.
2. Documents and communications sufficient to show all stakeholders, small businesses, nonprofits, local governments, tribal entities, and state officials DOI and BLM met with regarding the Superior Withdrawal, including, but not limited to, meetings that do not appear on public calendars.
3. Documents and communications sufficient to show all stakeholders, small businesses, nonprofits, local governments, tribal entities, and state officials DOI and BLM met with regarding the leases for Twin Metals, including, but not limited to, meetings that do not appear on public calendars.

The Committee requires a complete production responsive to the following five requests:

1. Please describe how the Superior Withdrawal and cancellation of the Twin Metals leases help the United States reduce its dependence on foreign adversaries for minerals.
2. Documents and communications sufficient to show the potential economic costs of the Superior Withdrawal, including, but not limited to, costs to stakeholders, small businesses, nonprofits, local governments, tribal entities, or state governments.
3. Documents and communications sufficient to show the analysis on the impacts the Superior Withdrawal will have on stakeholders, small businesses, nonprofits, local governments, tribal entities, and state governments.
4. Documents and communications sufficient to show the potential economic costs of cancelling the leases for Twin Metals, including, but not limited to, costs to stakeholders, small businesses, nonprofits, local governments, tribal entities, or state governments.
5. Documents and communications sufficient to show the analysis on the impacts that cancelling the leases for Twin Metals will have on stakeholders, small businesses, nonprofits, local governments, tribal entities, and state governments.

The Committee is no longer willing to allow DOI and BLM to stonewall our investigation. Failure to timely comply with the Committee's above requests will force us to use the compulsory process, including issuing a subpoena, to administer effective oversight and fulfill the Committee's responsibility to the American people.
